All the horses and donkey's we have rescued this year have been from Marion County. Shirley Anne Costango February 11, 1935 – December 3, 2017

Shirley was born in St. Georges, Delaware to Gertrude W. (Bright) and Robert C. Davidson. She graduated valedictorian from Delaware City High School and received a French National Merit Scholarship for college in 1953 but decided to forego college to marry her high school sweetheart H. James "Jim" Costango.

Jim enlisted in the United States Air Force and this led to their relocation to Tampa, Florida where they lived, worked and raised their three children over the course of 44 years. Shirley was the Vice President of Tam-Bay Realty in Florida until the company was sold in 1998. She then moved back to St. Georges, DE where she enjoyed her cats and friendships with new and old friends alike.

Shirley was a bright, compassionate woman with a wonderful sense of humor that remained with her always. She loved music, playing the piano, singing show tunes, watching old movies, all animals and beauty everywhere. She was a board member of the First Presbyterian Church Preservation Society and volunteered and contributed to animal rescue organizations throughout her life.

Shirley was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease in 2013 and eventually came to live in Tallahassee, FL. She read about the Horse Protection Association of Florida many years ago. And she thought the work they were doing was so wonderful that she decided to donate to them through her estate.

Merlin and Sassy

Merlin was found starving in Chiefland, Florida in May 2014. A former cow horse, he had been given to a young family who were ignorant as to the feed requirements of a horse. Merlin was a Body Condition Score 1, severely emaciated, weak and depressed. He had a large hematoma on his shoulder from where another horse had attacked him. I worried that the trailer ride back to the farm might be too much stress for Merlin and that he was too far gone to save.

I parked the trailer along the road and went inside to bring Merlin out. His head hung low, his hooves dragging along as he walked, showing his debilitation. As we got to the right of way and walked past the hedge, Merlin caught sight of the horse trailer, lifted his head, let out a whinny and took off trotting towards the trailer dragging me with him. Merlin jumped up into the trailer, went straight to the front and began eating the hay in the bag. I could hear him thinking, "Get me the heck out of here!"

From that point on the lethargic horse was gone and Merlin improved daily. He gained weight rapidly and within ninety days he was plump and has been on a strict diet ever since as he gains weight so easily.

Sassy was surrendered in a case with the Columbia County Sheriff's Office. She was a Body Condition Score 1, severely emaciated, her hooves overgrown from years of neglect. Sassy was a shell of a horse, she had no life in her at all, she seemed resigned to her fate.

Back at the farm the Sassy dove into the grass in her paddock and looked content immediately. Sassy gained weight easily and in sixty days she was healthy and plump.

The following year we had the good fortune to meet Gloria and Richard Oest. Gloria came to the farm and wanted to adopt two unrideable horses to live at their lovely Ocala property. Gloria picked out Merlin and Sassy, two individuals with kind dispositions and an affinity for any person with carrots.

In February 2015 Merlin and Sassy went to their new home with Gloria and Richard. Two formerly starved horses who suffered for untold years got a dream home with green grass, the best feed and care and unlimited love and affection from their family. Thank you, Gloria and Richard for giving Merlin and Sassy the best home we could have every wished for them.
